Combination Characters

Some characters not provided on the typewriter can be typed by combining two characters, w.g. by typing one character, backspacing and then typing the second character, e.g. the exclamation mark. First type the apostrophe (above the 8), back-space once, then type the full stop. An asterisk can be typed as follows:type an x, back-space once, then type the hyphen *. 


